



FAO Warns Of 'Unprecedented' Avian Flu Spread

he United Nations Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) has called for urgent action to strengthen biosecurity, surveillance and rapid-response mechanisms to curb the avian flu spread.

The Organisation says the rapid spread of the highly infectious avian flu virus H5N1 has reached an "unprecedented" scale, wiping out hundreds of millions of birds worldwide and

increasingly spilling over into mammals.

FAO's Deputy Director-General Godfrey Magwenzi said this while briefing member states in Rome. The official called for urgent action to strengthen biosecurity, surveillance and rapid-response mechanisms to curb the outbreak.

Mr. Magwenzi stressed that the crisis threatened to have "serious impacts on food security and food supply in countries, including loss of valuable nutrition, rural jobs and income, shocks to local economies, and of course, increasing costs to consumers." With millions relying on poultry for meat and eggs, the challenge is to contain the virus and protect food production systems. The economic impact is also being felt worldwide. For example, egg prices reached a record high in the United States during February, according to the U.S. Consumer Price Index,

with farmers forced to slaughter more than 166 million birds as the avian flu spread – mostly egg-laying chickens.

So far this year, more than 30 million birds in the U.S. have been killed, according to news reports. FAO Deputy Director-General Beth Bechdol underlined the need for a global, coordinated response, calling H5N1 a "transboundary" threat that no country could tackle alone.

FAO and the World Organisation for Animal Health (WOAH) launched a ten-year Global Strategy for the Prevention and Control of High Pathogenicity Avian Influenza to address the crisis.

"A chain is only as strong as its weakest link. By working together, we can reduce the impact of avian influenza and protect both animal and human health – locally and globally," Mr Bechdol said.

Over the past four years, H5N1 has expanded to new regions, causing massive losses in domestic birds, disrupting food supplies and increasing poultry prices. At least 300 new wild bird species have been affected since 2021, posing a serious threat to biodiversity.

FAO reaffirmed its commitment to global monitoring, data

sharing and technical guidance to help countries contain the virus.

Mr Bechdol also stressed the importance of private sector engagement, particularly in developing vaccines, diagnostics and high-quality animal health services.

The briefing also included a third call for funding proposals under the Pandemic Fund hosted by the World Bank.

Over the past two years, FAO has co-led dozens of Pandemic Fund projects to strengthen disease surveillance, early warning s y s t e m s a n d h e a l t h infrastructure to prevent future outbreaks.





However, what is evident is that women with chronic anxiety, depression, heart palpitations, indigestion or an array of these symptoms are often diagnosed with cardiovascular disease or heart failure.


Depression and anxiety accelerate heart risks

These issues aren't only found in older women but also in younger and middle-aged women.

Researchers followed more than 70,000 people for a decade and found that those with a history of depression and anxiety before the study were about 55% more likely to develop high blood pressure, high cholesterol and diabetes. Additionally, women under 50 with mental issues were nearly twice as likely to develop these cardiovascular risk factors.

According to the research,





bottling up your feelings is one of the worst things people can do, especially for women. In a study of more than 3,600 men and women from a Massachusetts town over 10 years, those who "self-silenced" or "kept their feelings bottled up" during marital issues were four times more likely to die during the study than those who said "how they felt." Importantly, this effect didn't apply to men. Regardless of a woman's marital happiness, what mattered was whether she expressed her feelings.

Additionally, women are also prone to a condition known as "broken heart syndrome." According to the Mayo Clinic, broken heart syndrome is a heart condition that's often brought on by stressful situations and extreme emotions.



Community Driven Change: Harnessing Local Networks To Empower Women

1. Introduction

Community-driven change refers to the social process whereby communities actively participate in, often lead, and own the identification, design, and execution of solutions for the challenges they face. There is growing global recognition that community-driven change is more sustainable and inclusive. and an increasing number of nonprofits, social enterprises and donors are embracing an approach that brings greater balance to the power and perspectives of communities in development processes. The continuum is built on the principle that recognises

• That communities all have a

success story, thus can build solutions from the point of success

- Communities have people with local knowledge, and have a right to choose how and who to engage with to support them in their journey of finding lasting, and sustainable solutions to identified challenges
- •Communities have the energy people, to drive their development.

Available literatures tend to interchange community driven change, community driven development and community driven impact depending on focus of study, and as such for the purpose of this paper, community driven impact, and

community driven development means community driven change.

1.1 Why Community Driven Change?

Community is about people and people live in a place, But as long as the objective being pursued is about improving their lives, that is achieved by focusing on what improves their lives which results from how people apply their energies.

1.2 The Path to Community Driven Change

There are quite a number of models or what can be termed pathways to community driven change-they include:



- Asset-based community led development
- Participatory community led development
- Collaborative Community led development
- Transformative Community led development
- Innovative Community led development
- SEED SCALE model of community led development

1.3 About SEED SCALE

SEED SCALE advocates community change that emanates and builds on existing community potential- COMMUNITY ENERGY, which is an existing and available resource, using a reiterative process based on the following principles:

Principle 1: Build from success: Focus on what is already working and study others success

Principle 2: Create partnerships: Involve communities, government, and other change

agents- while creating and recreating local coordinating committees to manage such collaborations

Principle 3: Make decisions based on evidence: Use facts instead of opinions- Evidence based decision making accentuates successful actions

Principle 4: Seek behaviour change: Focus on changing behaviours as the main outcome

2.0 The role of local networks in driving community change and empowering women Empowerment is a "social action process that promotes participation of people, organisations, and communities in gaining control over their lives in their community and larger society. Empowerment is about positive change and redistributing the balance of power in a given society, power being defined as control over resources and ideology. The resources may be categorised into physical, human, intellectual, financial, and self, including self-esteem,

confidence, and creativity. Ideology refers to beliefs, values, attitudes, and ways of thinking and perceiving situations (S. Batliwala, 1993). Consequently, empowerment is a process of awareness and capacity building leading to greater participation, to greater decision-making power and control, and to transformative action.

Women empowerment according to studies are within three dimensions:

- Personal: Developing a sense of self and individual confidence and capacity, and undoing the defects of internalised oppression.
- Rational: Developing the ability to negotiate and influence the nature of a relationship and decisions made within it.
- Collective: This includes involvement in political structures, but might also cover collective action based on cooperation rather than competition.

Forms of empowerment include economic, political and social. And for a woman to be empowered she must be seen to check the following indicators developed by Syed Hashemi (1996):

- 1) Mobility
- 2) Economic security
- 3) Ability to make small purchases
- 4) Ability to make larger purchases
- 5) Involvement in major decisions
- 6) Relative freedom from domination by the family
- 7) Political and legal awareness
- 8) Participation in public protests/dialogue and political campaigning.

These concepts and definitions point to the fact that you cannot really say you empower someone else or make someone empowered. You can however support the empowerment process which is seen to increase the degree of autonomy and self determination which enables people in this case women to represent their interest in a self determined way. This is what local women networks do, in supporting the process of empowerment including:

- Increasing influence by giving people and organisations a voice in decision-making. They can also help ensure that marginalised groups are represented and included.
- Helping people and organisations share resources including information, skills, and spaces towards promoting innovation and engendering stronger relationships
- Building partnerships and promoting mutual growth
- Exploring different viewpoints, innovating, and discovering new goals, careers, or projects.
- Mental health benefits through reducing

isolation by connecting with others who share similar interests and concerns.

• Increasing collective knowledge by bringing people and organisations together to work on problems and answer questions.

In economic development, networks are shown to boost women entrepreneurs' market access, business growth opportunities and participation in policy making. Networks are among the most pivotal resources an enterprise can leverage for the start-up and growth of a business. Some studies further demonstrate that participation in a network increases the social capital available to an entrepreneur, which can contribute to successful business growth (Dorcas Oke, 2013).

3.0 Conclusion

Empowerment and social change are interconnected concepts of continuous and iterative process towards fostering variables that bring about desired impact or change. Investing in women produces a multiplier effect, delivering not only increased revenue to local economies, but also better educated children, healthier families and more stable, secure and prosperous communities. The need to invest in women and harness the power and reach of women's networks is evident. Numerous studies show that women's empowerment and increased economic engagement are some of the smartest investments in long-term growth and development.

"The days after birth can be so intense and crazy and it's not really spoken about. It can be one of the most dangerous moments and it really bonds us as women.

"And motherhood is for everyone, not just for mothers, because we're all children," and the stories told through the pictures are widely relatable, she said. The Eye Mama collection shows different journeys women go through to become mothers, including pregnancy, birth, IVF, fostering, adoption and carers





"The water manoeuvres also served as a training exercise for upcoming Gungu warriors," he said.

Sununu recalled that the arrival of Europeans led the colonial government to ban hippopotamus hunting to preserve the species.

"Afterwards, Rigata became a prestigious display of wealth, power, and influence during wedding ceremonies of highly placed households. "The trend prevailed until the visit of the late Premier of Northern Nigeria, Sir Ahmadu Bello, Sardaunan Sokoto, to Yelwan-Yauri, during which Rigata, alongside an agricultural show, was organized to honor the premier," the minister narrated.

Earlier, the Chairman of the National Organising Committee, Alhaji Yakubu Bala-Tafida, described the festival as a significant milestone in celebrating and showcasing cultural heritage.



The Law and The Modern Woman: A Gender Perspective

It is very saddening that the vulnerability of a woman is termed or seen as we ak ness whereas it is true that every human being has a level of vulnerability too in one aspect of their lives or another and this is

simply because we all are humans with strengths and weaknesses irrespective of gender. Therefore, mutual respect is however desirable; that a person is not discriminated against simply on the basis of gender as qualification should be the hall mark and not a person's sex.

It is true that women have suffered certain setbacks in time past such as unequal pay for equal work as opposed to their male counter parts, however in current times the rights of women has been greatly strengthened by innovations in current laws as against their male counterparts, however there is still remains a lot of work to be done.

While this paper reviews some of the current law impacting positively on the rights of women, the scope of this paper shall be aimed at reviewing the deficiencies in current laws and the way forward.

RIGHTS, PROTECTION, DISCRIMINATION AND THE WAY FORWARD

Men and women are entitled to the same level of protection of their rights because they all are human beings. In the past, human rights had been conceptualized in a way that did not take account of women's lives and the fact that women routinely faced violence, discrimination and oppression. Consequently, women's experiences were until relatively recently not adequately addressed by the human rights framework. The work of activists in human rights mechanisms and States has been critical in ensuring that the human rights framework has

he role women play in society cannot be over-emphasized, as it is argued that in the absence of women there can be no society. This is typified in the African adage: educate a man and your educate an individual; educate a woman and you educate a nation. Little wonder why Nations are referred to as she.

For a gender with such an enormous function, it is only logical that a woman is not made out to be the subservient gender. Though it is true that there are areas of vulnerability in every female, however, these vulnerabilities (whatever it may

grown and adjusted to encapsulate the gender-specific dimensions of human rights violations in order to better protect women. Effectively ensuring women's human rights requires a comprehensive understanding of underlying societal structures and power relations that define and influence women's ability to enjoy their human rights. These power structures have an impact on all aspects of life, from law and politics, to economic and social policy, family and community life. There has been commendable legislations that have helped to shape and improve women rights particularly in Nigeria. The major lapse of these legislations however is their failure to consider the domestic need and peculiarity of the Nigerian state.

on human rights that touch on women's rights, the need for equality and freedom from discrimination. It also takes into consideration the peculiar circumstances of women in Africa and their vital role in development. As good as this protocol seems there still remains the problem of ratification, domestication and enforcement in the Nigerian state.

In Africa the treaty that cursorily provides for the protection of reproductive and sexual rights is the African Charter on Human and people's rights and the protocol to the African Charter which situates sexual health and rights within the recognition of women's reproductive rights as human rights.

rights are important, as well as fundamental rights contained in chapter IV of the extant constitution of Nigeria which are justiciable.

The extant Constitution of Nigeria as the ground norm particular prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex and against that backdrop there has been other enactments geared towards eliminating discrimination on the basis of sex

It was previously the position of the law that married women could not own properties but this position has however changed under the Matrimonial Causes Act as women married under law (the Act), where she is able to produce documents showing she made a contribution to the property, is entitled to the part of

> the property commensur ate to her contribution and where the property is bought in her name she gets to keep it.

The relevant laws as good as they seem have a major flaw which is their copy cat nature-their failure to take the domestic peculiarity of the

Nigerian state into consideration. For instance, the patriarchal nature of the Nigerian state makes it easy for barbaric discriminating cultures to thrive such as the culture in some part which sees women as chattels capable of being owned and inherited by the next male



The foremost of these legislations is the Protocol to the Africa Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights on the Rights of Women in Africa which is a unique piece of legislation because it takes into consideration the provisions of other international instruments

ratification by the national assembly in 1983 has been given binding effect by the constitution and has been recognized, however some of its provision are contained in the fundamental objectives and directive principles of state policy, regarded as chapter II, though non justiciable these

relative in the event of the death of the husband. A woman married under customary law is entitled to be provided with a home by her husband as long as the marriage lasts. She is also entitled to use her husband's property, but cannot dispose of it as her own even where it is jointly owned. The right to be provided with a house by her husband terminates upon divorce. Upon divorce, a woman married under customary law has no claim over a house jointly owned by her husband. Her position is not helped by the provisions of the Matrimonial Causes Act in respect of maintenance and settlement of property, which expressly excludes the application of its provisions to marriages under customary and Islamic law.

The Constitution and certain laws in Nigeria still contain discriminatory aspects. For instance, Section 26(2) of the Constitution does not allow a Nigerian woman to transmit her nationality to her husband if he is a foreigner however a Nigerian man married to a foreigner can do so. Section 55 of the Penal Code applicable in northern Nigeria permits wife battery as chastisement, as long as grievous harm is not afflicted. Section 55 of the Labour Act prohibits women from working in the night despite the fact that we now have more women as bread winners of their homes.

In most parts of Nigeria, female children are still discriminated against on issues of inheritance. With the decision in Mojekwu v Mojekwu, in which the Court of Appeal declared the 'oli-ekpe' custom of Nnewi – which permits the son or the brother of a deceased person to inherit his



property to the exclusion of his female children—discriminatory, it was expected that discrimination against women and the girl child on the issue of inheritance would end. This is definitely not the reality, probably because the decision has not gained nationwide popularity and poverty prevents women from going to court to assert their rights. Under Islamic law a girl child is not entitled to equal share of her father's estates with her brothers.

Conclusions and Recommendations

Despite the availability of current laws on this issue there remains some challenges hindering the actualization of gender equity, mutual respect and the elimination of discrimination. This paper herein proffers solutions in hopes that the issue of discrimination in the Nigerian state on the basis on gender would soon be a thing of the past.

In light of the current realities, it is pertinent that the government show its commitment by:

Domesticating the protocol; Passing the bill on violence against women;

Reviewing laws on women's property rights and all other laws discriminating against women;

Adequate budgetary allocations to issues that promote women's rights and bridge gender gaps; Integrating women's right issues and gender education into the school curriculum.

Providing mechanism for enforcement of the current laws. Sponsoring programmes geared at public education and enlightenment on the need to eradicate discrimination
